This policy defines de-escalation as a first level of intervention when working with youth committed or detained at the SYSC.

Re	Required Practices			
An	Any deviations to the following information must be documented with Supervisory Approval.			
Ι.	All staff shall be trained in de-escalation techniques.			

- II. Staff shall utilize "teachable moments" with youth and seek to minimize the need for restrictive interventions.
- III. Staff shall attempt de-escalation techniques as a first course of action whenever possible and with the least disruption possible.
- IV. Staff shall encourage youth to take a "cooling-off" when initial attempts to de-escalate a situation have not proven successful (unless there is an imminent threat to the youth or others).
 - A. Staff will calmly discuss the request and possible alternatives if the youth does not want to take a cooling-off.
 - B. If the youth agrees to a cooling-off, staff will direct the youth to the designated area and inform the youth that staff will check in every 5 minutes.
 - 1. If the designated area is the youth's bedroom, the **youth's door must** remain open and unlocked.
- V. An Incident Report (Form 2085 SYSC Moderate Incident Report or Form 2086 Major Incident Report) shall be completed in YouthCenter when:
 - A. The youth remains in their room for longer than 15 minutes;
 - B. Staff directed the youth to take a cooling-off; or

- C. The youth's behavior before or during a cooling-off meets the criteria for a rules violation.
- VI. Staff must document all cooling-off periods and all 5-minute check-ins for youth taking a cooling-off.
 - A. Cooling-off periods of less than 15 minutes are documented in the YouthCenter Record of Discipline.
 - B. A Watch/Safety Check Report (Form 2079) must be initiated and updated accordingly if the cooling-off exceeds 15 minutes.
 - 1. The corresponding YouthCenter Incident Report number is noted on the form.
 - C. If the youth is unable to return to programming within the first hour, refer to policy 2083 Restrictive Intervention.
- VII. Youth may be referred to the Crisis Services Unit in accordance with policy 2170, when further supportive interventions are deemed necessary for the safety of youth and staff.
 - A. A referral to the Crisis Services Unit must not be made as a consequence or punishment.
