Introduction:

He-M 517 defines the requirements and procedures for Medicaid-covered home and community-based care waiver services for persons with developmental disabilities and acquired brain disorders where such services are provided pursuant to He-M 503, He-M 507, He-M 513, He-M 518, He-M 521, He-M 522, He-M 525, and He-M 1001 The propose rules readopt with amendment He-M 517.

This proposal was published in the October 19, 2023, Rulemaking Register. The Department held a public hearing on Thursday, November 16, 2023, with no members of the public in attendance. The Department did receive testimony within the public comment period. Those proposed comments and the Departments responses have been summarized in the below table.
