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CHANGES TO NEW HAMPSHIRE LEAD REPORTING RULES

On June 11, 2020, the New Hampshire Division of Public Health Services made changes to the [He-P 1600 Lead Poisoning Prevention and Control rules](#) that impact blood lead reporting to the Healthy Homes and Lead Poisoning Prevention and Control Program (HHLPPP). The changes include:

- 1) **A UNIQUE SPECIMEN ID NUMBER IS REQUIRED FOR EACH BLOOD TEST**
- 2) **TIMEFRAME FOR REPORTING TO THE DIVISION OF PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICES:**

Lead result of 45 μ g/dL or higher	1 BUSINESS DAY
Lead result from 10 to 44 μ g/dL	3 BUSINESS DAYS
Lead result of 0 to 9 μ g/dL	5 BUSINESS DAYS

- 3) **REPORTING FIELDS REQUIRED BY LAW:**

- o Name of the individual;
- o Individual's date of birth;
- o Individual's street address, town/city, State, and postal code;
- o First and last name of the clinical provider ordering the test;
- o Name and address of the health care institution where the clinical provider works;
- o Name, address and phone number of the submitting laboratory;
- o Name of the referring laboratory, if applicable;
- o Whether the specimen is a venous or capillary sample;
- o Date of the sample collection;
- o Date of the sample analysis;
- o Blood lead analysis results;
- o Individual's race & ethnicity;
- o Individual's gender;
- o Name of the individual's parent/ guardian if the individual is aged 15 years or younger;
- o Occupation of individuals aged 16 years or older;
- o Name of the individual's employer when testing is a requirement of the individual's occupation;
- o Method of analysis; and
- o Results of erythrocyte protoporphyrin analysis and zinc protoporphyrin analysis used to identify anemia and elevated blood lead levels, if conducted.
