



Supports Intensity Scale – Adult Version™ 2nd Edition

Overview of the SIS-A, 2nd Edition

- The SIS-A™ is a standardized assessment that measures the pattern and intensity of supports an adult (16 years and older) with intellectual and developmental disabilities requires to be successful in community settings.
- Updates the first version, originally release in 2004 and refreshed in 2015 by the American Association on Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (AAIDD). 2nd Edition of the SIS-A was released in January 2023 and includes updated norms as well as several enhancements.
- Completed in a group interview with people who know the individual very well.
 - 2 respondents, including the individual must be present during the assessment
- A qualified assessor guides the discussion and helps the respondent team determine accurate ratings during the interview
- The SIS-A measures an individual's
 - Exceptional Medical and Behavioral Support Needs
 - Support Needs for Life Activities in the areas of Home Living Activities, Community Living Activities, Health and Safety Activities, Lifelong Learning Activities, Work Activities, Social Activities, Advocacy Activities



SIS-A 2nd Edition Release

- Assessments can take 2-4 hours so please plan accordingly
- Section 1 of the SIS-A consists of Exceptional Medical and Behavioral Support needs.
- Section 2 is where discovery happens. Respondents and the assessor discuss what supports would best fit the needs in 7 adult life settings.
 - Strengths based focus
 - Consider the individuals potential, strengths and positive qualities
 - Does not focus on what the individual cannot do but what they <u>CAN</u> do with the right supports
- The team will determine the right combination of the type of support, frequency of support, and daily support time needing to help the individual be an active participant in the same life activities with other adults in their community.



Benefits of the Changes to the 2nd Edition of the SIS-A

- New norms ensure that a person's scores remain meaningful in comparison to today's population rather than with people from over 20 years ago.
- New items added to the Exceptional Support needs section will provide better distinctions in support need and ensure that important support needs are not overlooked.
- The supplemental Protection and Advocacy (P&A) Activities scale is renamed Advocacy Activities scale to better reflect the agency of the individual assessed.
- The Advocacy Activities scale is incorporated into the SIS-A as a normed scale which broadens the understanding of a person's overall support needs and identifies the supports a person with IDD needs to advocate for themselves.



Benefits of the Changes to the 2nd Edition of the SIS-A


- Data analysis confirms that the SIS-A remains a valid assessment of support needs among adults with IDD up to age 84.
- The Employment Activities scale is renamed Work Activities to clarify that its focus is on support needed to engage in meaningful work activities across the adulthood and is applicable to older adults who may have retired from the workforce.
- The reorganization of some sections, scales, and items makes the interview more efficient and flow more smoothly.
- Minor edits in the wording and phrasing of headings and item descriptions provide greater clarity for users.



Plan For Rolling Out the SIS-A

- ☐ Implementing SIS-A assessments in November 2023
- □ PCG will work the Department to develop a SIS-A Referral Process
- ☐ PCG will work with the Area Agencies to schedule assessments
- 3 Full Time assessors
- ☐ Anticipating ~120 assessments per month

SIS Levels Developed for New Hampshire

- SIS Assessments will continue to be conducted.
 - The resulting score, along with responses to supplemental questions, will be used to match assessed needs with support level.
- New Hampshire will use seven SIS levels to identify rates.
 - This model is similar to programs in other states.

SIS Level	Support Needs	Behavioral Support	Medical Support
Level 1	Little to None	Low	Low
Level 2	Moderate	Low	Low
Level 3	Little to Moderate	High	Low
Level 4	Moderate to High	Low to High	Low
Level 5	High to Maximum	Low to High	Low
Level 6	High to Maximum	Low to High	Extraordinary
Level 7	High to Maximum	Extraordinary	Low to High
