Raising a Relative Child

Raising a child when you had long since considered your child-rearing days behind you can be difficult.

Grandparents and other older relatives, often called "kinship caregivers" do not always have the stamina, the energy and the resources they had when they were younger to meet the day-to-day needs of a child or children.

One on One Support is available with a ServiceLink staff member who can assist you in looking at options available to you.

Grandparent and relative caregivers who are 55 years of age or older may be able to access, through ServiceLink, Federal or State funded **respite care services.**

Respite care could be occasional childcare, day or overnight camp, structured after school activities, or homemaker services.

The services allow the grandparent or relative caregiver occasional breaks and a chance to take a little time to care for one's own needs.
